SO HERE WE ARE

If only there were evil people somewhere insidiously committing evil deeds, and it were necessary only to separate them from the rest of us and destroy them. But the line dividing good and evil cuts through the heart of every human being. And who is willing to destroy a piece of his own heart?" —Alexander Solzhenitsyn

Everything Jesus did and said was within the context of proclaiming and living the Kingdom of God. Living the Redemptive Life. "Good news to the poor, release of the captives, recovery of sight to the blind, let the oppressed go free," and Jesus says "Today, with me here, this Scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing." Jesus says, "I'm doing this now."

Jesus tells a parable of someone giving a banquet. He invites people, but what do they do? They make excuses. "Yeah, I can't make it." So whom does Jesus invite to fill his banquet hall? "Bring in the poor, the crippled, the blind, and the lame." And look at this—his servant says, "Sir, what you ordered has been done." Did the servants know the character of the man so well that they immediately knew, "Okay, this is who we need to bring in. It's not full yet? Go out into the roads and lanes. Tell people they are welcome, they are wanted, they are valued and loved and invited to *this* banquet."

In that culture, you had a banquet so that important people could see how rich you were and those you invited would owe you and repay you by inviting you to their banquets. How many of these new guests will be able to pay back the banquet host in kind? None? Remember, it's a parable. This is the Kingdom of God. People are welcome, and all they have to do is say "yes." Like when Jesus went to the land of the Gerasenes and healed the man possessed by demons, right? Who is willing? I don't care how broken or screwed up you are, don't come at me with your "I'm not qualified, I'm too messed up!" Will you come to my banquet? Will you receive this grace? Faithfulness is simply, "Will you try?"

Jesus, himself, in utero, still in Mary's womb, *is* the poor, *is* the outcast. There was no place *for them* in the inn; I don't mean the rooms were full, I mean they weren't welcome. These aren't nice stories to make us feel cozy, these are descriptions of God's Kingdom turning these upside down cultures and values of our world right side up.

Jesus' Kingdom of love is for the screwed up among us. This Kingdom is for those of us who struggle, literally or figuratively, to get out of bed in the morning, in whatever form that takes for you. I assume that all of us are screwed up in some way or we wouldn't be following Jesus.

If you're thinking to yourself, "Well, I'm not really screwed up," I think that means—how do I say this nicely—you haven't figured it out yet. When I read the Gospels, the only thing that I can see that might disqualify *anyone* from joining in the Kingdom of God, or entering the Redemptive Life, is believing you're righteous on your own and have no need for God or redemption or grace. If you believe you have *nothing* in your life for which you need forgiveness, how will you receive grace? I call that delusion. That's self-selecting, not Jesus telling anyone they're unwelcome. Those invited to the banquet all alike made excuses. "Yeah, I'm good. I don't need that banquet." The Redemptive Life makes no sense for someone who believes they have no need to be redeemed, who has never had any trouble getting out of bed and is already self-righteous, which means that evil in everyone else's heart—remember, we said --that doesn't really apply to them.

Responsible manufacturers are trying to reduce their carbon footprint by changing the way they package their products, avoiding plastic which is made from fossil fuels. Some of them are committed to recycling the plastic packaging they do use. Think about the plastic bags that Fred Meyer and other grocery stores collect to be recycled – filling the gap in traditional recycling that won't take plastic bags because they clog the recycling machinery.

Here's another way to recycle some rejected products. PACT is a non-profit that helps the beauty industry be responsible for their packaging, working toward the circular solution of reusing their own plastic waste. The beauty company Ulta with a store in the Wenatchee Valley Mall has a collection box for the following beauty product containers:

- Small plastic, metal, or paper bottles and jars smaller than a yogurt cup
- plastic or aluminum squeeze tubes
- colored glass bottles or jars (check locally)
- caps and closures
- pump dispensers
- droppers
- lipstick and lip balm tubes
- toothpaste tubes (cut open, flattened and cleaned)
- dental floss containers
- silicone containers
- pouches
- small supplement bottles (2" by 2")

DEACONS

The quarterly Bread and Cup Communion will be held October 5 – World Communion Sunday - during our worship service. Any individual attending the service is welcome to participate. You don't have to be a member, or baptized or a certain age (as adult). The "wine" is grape juice. Participants come to the altar to receive the bread and cup sacraments. But, if you are not able to come forward and remain in your seat, a Deacon will bring the bread and cup to you.

Some of our congregation prefer to use the hymnal (and the printed music) as opposed to following the song through the power point. Hymnals are available on a small shelf as you enter the sanctuary (right door facing the front of the sanctuary). This replaces the cart that we brought into the Narthex before worship. If the song is not in a hymnal there isn't music available. That cart also had free paperback bibles. The Bibles are on a self in the back corner of the Narthex near the bulletin board. If you know someone who needs a Bible, please give them one of these. They were bought for the purpose of sharing the word.


